


CELEBRATION NEWSLETTER – Summer 2025 Dobcroft Nursery Infant School

Ruby and Daisy's story – raising awareness of epilepsy in our school community

Ruby (Woodpeckers) and Daisy's (Ladybirds) parents wanted to share their experience to raise awareness as 1 in 200 children have epilepsy, which means there's likely to be 1–2 children at DNIS with epilepsy at any one time.

Daisy had a seizure out of the blue a week after her 3rd birthday in July 2024. By October half term she'd had four seizures and was officially diagnosed with epilepsy in November.

In these five months Daisy had multiple hospital visits (ambulance to A&E each seizure), tests, and appointments, and she never once complained (well maybe a little when she couldn't eat for hours before an MRI due to needing a general anaesthetic!).



During these many hospital visits, Ruby has had to spend a lot of time with other family members but never complained that mummy and daddy had to be with Daisy. Daisy's MRI was on Halloween so she couldn't go trick or treating with their cousins as planned so Ruby took Daisy's bag and made sure she collected treats for her sister.

Daisy is now on medication twice a day which she sometimes finds hard, but Ruby is a brilliant cheer leader for her and encourages her when she's not keen. They have both taken all of this in their stride, and couldn't be prouder.

Eco conference

In May, DNIS collaborated with Early Education and hosted a

half-day, eco-conference designed to support early years practitioners in weaving outdoor learning, climate education, and sustainability into everyday practice. We were joined by a number of eco-specialists from the region and country to share their knowledge and skills. Dobcroft shared all they have been doing to foster an ethos of sustainability across our school and children.



Biodiversity Research Project – Tomorrow's Climate Scientists





We were lucky enough to be accepted to become part of a

research project funded by the Royal Society in collaboration with Sheffield Hallam University, It's brief was "How to translate climate research for younger demographics?" We were teamed up with a Climate Ambassador, Kaisu Koski, She worked with Zoe Singh, Deputy Head Teacher and eight Y2 children – offering a Wonderland Biodiversity Class.

Throughout five sessions, the project integrated art, science, activism, and contemplation. We've been learning about the endangered Hazel Dormouse as an epitome of biodiversity (loss). To welcome the dormouse back, we set up a magical multispecies tea party, created climate activist posters, produced Green Corridor guerrilla street art, and turned inward in hibernation meditation. It's been heart—warming and mind—blowing to witness the children's creativity, intuition, and care towards the natural world.

Kaisu recently shared the project at the "Rethinking Fables in the Age of the Environmental Crisis" conference at the University of Kent, and will continue to write about it in her monograph—in—progress with Peter Lang Academic Publishing.












Star Baker & Share a Story

Celebrating School Representatives



A massive thank you to the children that have taken the time to represent our school this year. They were thanked with a visit from the ice-cream van, which was very excitedly received!

Children are given the opportunity to apply for or be selected for the following roles of responsibility within school:

- Rights Respecting Student council selected based on an application process
- Eco Reps selected by class teachers
- E-cadets selected by class teachers
- Science Ambassadors selected based on an application process
- Art Ambassadors selected by class teachers
- Playground Leaders including Sports Leaders selected based on an application process
- Healthy Eating Reps-selected by class teachers
- Healthy Mind Champions selected based on an application process

These roles give children a voice in our school community, they support pupils to develop an understanding that they can have a direct impact on our school because of their action. Pupils are selected based on enthusiasm, experience and as an opportunity for character development. Playground Leaders are recruited from Y2 to help support younger pupils at break and lunchtime. Pupils develop a range of skills including time management, teamwork, cooperation, collaboration, planning and empathy. Each of these groups meet with their adult leader each half term.

Ofsted Feedback

As you are aware, we had a trial inspection for the new, proposed Ofsted framework that is due to be published in the autumn term. Although we are unable to give any specific feedback, we wanted to say thank you to all the parents that contributed to the discussions with inspectors and let you know that we were really pleased with the feedback.

Eco Funding

We have been successful in securing a number of grants to support our eco work. These include:

Local Schools Nature Grant – we were successful in gaining funding for wet weather clothing, *Learning Through Landscapes* will support us to conduct a climate audit and provide CPD for staff in the Autumn term.



Landscapes

Food Works – we won £100 of hardy Sheffield veggie seedlings. Our Eco team have planted these out with the aim of eating the fully grown plants at the end of the year in our salad bar at lunchtime.



RHS Wentworth Woodhouse – are donating established plants that have been used in their show gardens. We were recommended as a school that would make good use of these by the National Education Nature Parks (we have worked closely with them this year). They will be planted in the sensory garden area in front of Woodpeckers classroom.
