


WALT: use aerial maps to recognise basic features and key symbols

Why do we use aerial photographs?



Introduce

Aerial photographs are useful to help us identify landmarks that we could not see as easily from the ground.



Let's label the aerial photograph of the school with the key landmarks below!

Introduce

Maps are covered in symbols to show the different landmarks.




Symbols are an easy way to represent something that everyone can understand!


