

No artist has ever made us aware of our eyes in the way Bridget Riley has.


The 'op art' became very popular in the 1960's

I can add colour to my lines




Bridget Riley uses combinations of different lines to create optical illusions in her artwork. Sometimes she uses different colours, other times she uses light and dark lines.
